I want to commend the Village board for the 10 years research and consideration and for noticing a year ago the need for regulations following the 911 smoke call. We bought one. Yes, there were rentals where the owners were asked to leave due to lack of care. Many houses needed painting and repair. We've watches as houses and public buildings have been repaired, painted, landscaped and it feels like the community has an increasing sense of pride. We too are proud of this little village. These changes have happened due to the people who live here. They have a vested interest in this vital community.

I have lived next door to a Short Term Rental now for 8 years. I love chatting with the people and seeing their delight in this vital community. Let's be a welcoming community. It seems like three complaint calls from visitor to Short Term Rentals are a minimal concern considering other calls for service. Enforcing the proposed restrictive law will require additional staff time to enforce.

Health and safety of visitors to Short Term Rental are important consideration but it seems reasonable regulations could be made at the current levels of 21 short term rentals with a simpler method for annual renewal. Kay Burkett
